Chairperson's Foreword 2023

We are filled with gratitude for another year of engagement with a multitude if individuals and groups who seek to bring the insights and practices of spiritual traditions into a great variety of daily life settings. In the past year, we were honoured to have an MA student explore the development of a toolkit of spiritual practices for carers. She developed this toolkit from her own experience of caring for her son who was born with autism and of looking after her mother who had developed dementia. The demands of caregiving can be exhausting and overwhelming, but the toolkit which was developed for sharing with other long-term care givers had been tried and tested for reining in stress and regaining a sense of balance, joy, and hope in life.

SpIRE appreciates the power of research to bring life-giving responses to some of the challenges which face society. In this context the research project of the MA participants each year is an essential contribution to positive change in society. The MA dissertations for each year are listed on the website https://spiritualityinstitute.ie/research and are available for review in the library. These dissertations are often at the frontiers of knowledge, such as exploring the implications of the new science of kindness for those in leadership roles today.

Through collaborating with SpirSoP www.wit.ie/spirsop, an accredited Research Centre for the study of spirituality at South East Technological University (SETU), it is possible for SpIRE to apply to a diversity of research funds which are available to forward critical research at this time. In particular, collaboration is being developed with the other universities of the European University of which SETU is a member (https://www.eu-conexus.eu/en/). In particular, collaboration is being established with a Spanish University which supports pilgrims with Motor Neurone Disease through improved wheelchair design. The eighth cohort of MA in Applied Spirituality students was admitted in September 2023.

Good governance continues to be a priority. Risk management has received particular attention in the past year. SpIRE is enormously grateful to the Irish Province of the Society of Jesus who provide a beautiful home for SpIRE activities n Milltown Park. The very generous sponsorship of the Presentation Sisters (North East Province), the Order of Discalced Carmelites, the All Hallows Trust, and the Jesuits (Irish Province) have provided the financial support to enable SpIRE to grow, to sponsor students in need, and to support innovative research.

I congratulate all who collaborate with SpIRE in successfully delivering MA and PhD studies. I express my gratitude to Kathleen Lyng CHF, to Margie Kennedy and to Lisa Power for their practical support of SpIRE's Vision and Mission through Library, Secretarial and hospitality volunteer services. I am very appreciative of the commitment of the Advisory Committee who support SpIRE's vision and mission in public events, publications and conferences. Ad multos annos!

Director's Foreword 2023

The new South East Technological University (SETU) consisting of Waterford Institute of Technology (WIT) and the Institute of Technology Carlow, which came into being on May 1, 2022, continued to develop during 2023. MA and PhD studies in applied spirituality were now being offered at a technological university for the first time in Ireland. SpIRE was delighted to have played a major role in bringing these studies to the new university and provides a first-class specialist library in the discipline, in Dublin, where it hosts and supports such university studies. It was also delighted to have played an innovative role in the Spirituality in Society and Professions (SpirSoP) Research Group of SETU, which is the first group of its kind in an Irish university and which is led by the Chair of SpIRE. During 2023, also, the Chair, and a graduate of the MA in Applied Spirituality, who was appointed Honorary Research Fellow of SETU's School of Humanities to work with SpIRE, advanced the editing of what will be a ground-breaking book on research methods in contemplative and spirituality studies.

As a result of the creation of the new university, graduation day for the 2021-22 MA students was changed to 11 January 2023. On that day 10 students graduated with an SETU MA in Applied Spirituality, 4 with a Postgraduate Diploma in Applied Spirituality, and two with a Postgraduate Certificate. 4 more completed all the requirements to graduate, with the exception of the dissertation, which they deferred to 2023. Many of SpIRE's members are also SETU programme staff, and two of them, the Director and the Chair, along with the Head of Humanities, wrote the programme for WIT/SETU and were very involved in leading it through the approval process.

Feedback from the MA graduates is further evidence of the impact of SpIRE in developing and disseminating the value of spirituality study, research, and practice for lived experience and the professions. INTRODUCTION

The Spirituality Institute for Research and Education (SpIRE) was established in 2015 to serve the spiritual seeking of people. It emphasises the value of the academic study of spirituality in higher education, and the interface of spirituality with the professions and the issues that arise in a range of settings such as work, family, relationships, life-transitions, and concerns regarding human, societal, and planetary wellbeing.

In order to serve this global spiritual awakening and the journey of life in its spiritual dimension and connection, SpIRE aims to develop contemplative and critically informed spirituality guides, reflective practitioners, spirituality theoreticians, and skilled researchers. It gives effect to its aims through education, research, conferences, training, consultancy, publishing, leadership and networking.

OBJECTIVES OF THE CHARITY

DELIVERY OF MA in APPLIED SPIRITUALITY

The MA in Applied Spirituality, now a programme of the South East Technological University (SETU), Ireland, takes place in Milltown Park, Milltown Road, Dublin D06 W9Y7, Ireland (image above). It gained accreditation in 2016 from what was then the Waterford Institute of Technology (WIT) making it the first time in Ireland for an Institute of Technology to accredit a postgraduate programme in applied spirituality. The first version of the programme ran at Milltown Institute, Dublin from 2001 (NCEA, HETAC, NUI). In those years it was a 2-year programme. The first year was a HDip year and was mandatory for progression to the MA. In 2010 the programme was rewritten as a one-year programme in order to become a DCU award at All Hallows College (DCU).

SpIRE hosts and supports the programme which has the unique benefit of the internationally-leading SpIRE library for applied spirituality studies. The MA is also served by a very experienced and distinguished team of lecturers, research supervisors, and spiritual accompaniers.

ADVANCEMENT OF RESEARCH / PUBLICATIONS

Initiatives taken by members of SpIRE to advance research and publications in the field of the academic study of applied spirituality during 2023 included:

- Encouraging and supporting a graduate of the MA in Applied Spirituality to apply for an SETU PhD scholarship to study the role of inner development goals in relation to the UN's sustainability development goals. The graduate was successful in her application. The overall purpose of this scholarship programme is to promote high quality, innovative research and the provision of research and development training for highly skilled graduates leading to the award of a PhD, and to support the increase in PhD numbers at SETU, in line with national priorities.
- Another graduate of the MA in Applied Spirituality, who also holds a PhD in a different discipline, gave a paper at the Society for Education and Research international conference on "Being Spiritual While Doing Research" held in Germany and his paper was well received. SpIRE continued its collaboration with and leadership in developing a fully accredited Research Group for the study of Spirituality in Society and the Professions (SpirSoP) at South East Technological University (SETU).

• The second year of the **spirituality studies book club**, led by the Director, with participants from the SpirSoP research group took place in 2023. The group consists of faculty and PhD spirituality students of SETU who avail of the SpIRE library, and members of SpIRE. The book club was one of the outcomes of a day of reflection of the SpirSoP research group. It was formed to study writings about spirituality and to give members the opportunity to learn more about each other's perspectives in this field of study. The group first studied *Critical Reflection*, *Spirituality*, and *Professional Practice* by Dr Cheryl Hunt, Exeter University and

during 2023 *Religion around Virginia Woolf* by Prof Stephanie Paulsell of Harvard University. Both Dr Hunt and Prof Paulsell held sessions with the group. The book being studied in 2023-24 is *The Blue Sapphire of the Mind – Notes for a Contemplative Ecology* by Doug Christe.

• The Chair was invited to take part in an event in Enniscorthy in March to mark the launch of the new Wexford-Pembrokeshire Pilgrim Way. This initiative will link Ferns in North Wexford with St Davids in Pembrokeshire and is part of the wider EU funded Ancient Connections project linking these two regions through arts, heritage and tourism. Ancient Connections is leading a free symposium to celebrate pilgrimage and address three key questions: how do you create a successful pilgrim route; what's in it for all of us; and is there a difference between a tourist and a pilgrim? INSS International Conference on 'Spirituality, Critical Reflection, and Professional Practice in an Uncertain World', May 2023

The Director of SpIRE, who is also a member of the Executive Committee of the International Network for the Study of Spirituality (INSS) and the Links Coordinator of INSS with other organisations engaged in spirituality studies around the world, was the lead organiser and Chair of the 7th biennial international conference of INSS (formerly the British Association for the Study of Spirituality). The title of the conference was 'Spirituality, Critical Reflection, and Professional Practice in an Uncertain World' and it took place in the South East Technological University, Waterford, Ireland from May 16-18.

It was the first time for the biennial conference to be held outside the UK and it received great support from staff in catering services, educational services, and estates at SETU. Planning for the conference began in January of 2022. SpIRE was the partner organisation for the conference, which it supported in various ways. The conference was the most significant conference on spirituality studies to ever take place in Ireland. (See https://spiritualitystudiesnetwork.org/CONFERENCE-2023).

160 delegates came from 25 countries and 5 continents. 5 keynotes and 80 parallel papers were delivered. As well as the Director of SpIRE, the Chair of SpIRE, and the Programme Leader of the MA in Applied Spirituality were members of the Academic Committee that reviewed the abstracts. The Director, who also serves on the Editorial Board of INSS' prestigious *Journal for the Study of Spirituality*, gave one of the keynotes at the conference (see photo below). As well as presenting at the conference, the Chair, other members of SpIRE, and the PhD students that SpIRE works with gave presentations and chaired sessions. An electronic copy of the conference booklet with abstracts of all the presentations, etc. is available from the Director of SpIRE. The global Society for the Study of Christian Spirituality (SSCS) exists to promote research and dialogue within the community of persons interested in the field of spirituality. The SSCS is ecumenical and interdisciplinary, encouraging the application of diverse critical approaches to the study of spirituality. The membership of the SSCS is drawn from universities, seminaries, and higher education colleges in various countries, especially the United States. The Chair of SpIRE is a past-president of the Society and was the first ever Irish president. She and the Director previously served on the Society's Governing Board. In November, in San Diego, the latter, having been Vice-President and President-Elect for the previous year, became the first Jesuit, first Irish male, and third European to be elected as President by his peers the more than thirty years of the Society's https://spiritualityinstitute.ie/new-leader-of-christian-spirituality/). He had also previously served on the Steering Committee of the Christian Spirituality Group of the American Academy of Religion, the Promotions Committee of the Society, the International Relations Committee of the Society, of which he is a founder, and he continues to serve on the Editorial Board of the Society's journal, Spiritus, a world leading academic journal for the study of Christian spirituality.


An event in June by Companions for the Journey, an initiative of the Emerging Scholars Group





LIBRARY RESOURCES at SpIRE

The Library's collection is the premier collection in Europe of over 9,000 books and associated journals for the study of contemporary and applied spiritualities. This collection has been carefully built over the past 30 years primarily through the substantial initial book donation of the Irish Jesuits, with a significant contribution by the Irish Vincentians to the collection after the MA in Applied Spirituality and PhD studies in spirituality ceased at All Hallows College when the College was sold to DCU. Today a modest per capita from South East Technological University for registered students of the MA in Applied Spirituality and the exceptionally generous annual donation of the Presentation Sisters, North East Province enable the stocks to grow in line with the ever-new fields of research in spirituality which are developing: e.g., trauma-informed spirituality, spiritual needs of neurodiverse persons, and kindness as a spiritual practice

INCOME - WHERE WE GET OUR INCOME



Michael O'Sullivan is the Co-Founder and Director of the Spirituality Institute for Research and Education in Ireland (SpIRE) and of the Spiritual Capital Ireland Centre which SpIRE superseded. He is a Research Fellow at the University of the Free State, South Africa, President of the global Society for the Study of Christian Spirituality (SSCS), and a member of the Executive Committee of the International Network for the Study of Spirituality (INSS) and its Links Coordinator with organisations engaged in spirituality studies across the world. He is a

member of the Editorial Board of both *Journal for the Study of Spirituality* and *Spiritus*, two of the leading international journals for the study of spirituality.

Noel is voluntary National Coordinator for Christian Meditation in Ireland and he coordinates their *Meditation with Children Project*, involving 35,000 children who meditate as a whole-school practice in over 150 primary schools across Ireland. He offers in-service, free of charge, to school staffs who are interested in introducing meditation to children. Noel also works with teachers at second-level and lecturers at third-level who are interested in introducing teenagers and young adults to the practice of meditation.

He spent 40 years in the education sector in Ireland as a second-level teacher and principal and as Education Officer with the Presentation Sisters in Ireland. He is author *of Mission Integrity: Having Faith in Our Schools*, which explores how trustees and schools may reflect together on the challenge of remaining faithful to their vision and mission. His most recent book is *Meditation with Children – A Resource for Teachers and Parents*. Dr Bernadette Masterson

Bernadette Masterson obtained her PhD in Medical Humanities from All Hallows College, Dublin City University in 2016. Her chosen topic, spiritual awakening in chronic illness, has been close to her heart for many years and her research, utilising a psycho-spiritual approach, uniquely highlights ways in which chronic illness may foster opportunities for ongoing awakening to deeper levels of consciousness. Her dissertation has been published as a book by Peter Lang. She supervises research dissertations in the MA in Applied Spirituality. She is also a trained spiritual director.

Bernadette completed a four-year training in psychosynthesis, leading to an MA from London's Institute of Psychosynthesis/University of Middlesex in2001. Psychosynthesis is a transpersonal psychology founded by Italian psychoanalyst Roberto Assagioli, a contemporary of Freud and Jung. Its framework holds that humans are essentially spiritual beings having a human experience, and contain within them a drive to become whole. She produced reports from the Middle East on human rights issues, such as the refugee crisis in Jordan (interviewed King Hussein) following the Gulf War in 1991, sanctions in Iraq, and territorial disputes in Yemen. 
